
Infinitely malleable (or almost so)

Minimum

Maximum

Any new reality described by words can be created Nature can be fully controlled

ROOTS/EVOLUTION

Evolutionary theory permeates our culture with a sense of progress

Even if evolution is "guided by god" or panpsychism, it can still serve this purpose



Instead of formal doctrinal creeds, the Social Gospel stressed ethical social behavior. Instead of a threat, it saw in evolution a great opportunity for moving the church to a mission of Christian social action. This is not to suggest that the Social Gospel swallowed evolution whole; like the Reform Darwinism of Lester Frank Ward, it rejected the harsh, laissez-faire, survival-of-the-fittest, social Darwinism of figures such as Yale sociologist William Graham Sumner. From evolutionary thinking, the Social Gospel drew not a harsh determinism, but rather a divine plan for human liberation and advancement. In this respect, its evolutionary foundations were of the historicist variety, which saw in human history not just random adaptation to endless change, but social development through the force of history that would ultimately culminate in a perfected social order.

The first cycle of the totalitarian trap



The world has a habit of leaving those behind who won't go with it. The world has always neglected stand-patters. CONVINCE





A problem of foremost importance at the present time is the management of labor to secure efficient work and satisfied men. MPROVE

There must be some moral or educational deficiency in those who refuse to progress

They need to be fixed

The third cycle of the totalitarian trap



We have more than once contrasted the view that progress is to be secured mainly by the deliberate elimination of the "unfit," with the more humane, or in what is perhaps a more descriptive phrase, the economic view, that progress is to come mainly through the rescue of the "unfit" and their transformation into fit and desirable citizens.




Almost (but not) all progressive programs eventually end up concluding that making progress means eliminating people who will not progress

We intend to bring people out of the technology-driven mainstream culture


Technical progress is possible


